Summer Clean-Up Brush Collection

Brush pick-up will continue every Monday. Leaves and clippings must be bagged or boxed or they will not be picked up. Bags or boxes should not exceed 50 pounds. If you have a large amount of brush, we still have an adopt a truck program. A truck can be reserved by coming into the office and signing one out. Trucks are dropped off to you generally between 3 and 3:30 p.m. and then picked up the following morning. Trucks can also be reserved for the week-end and are dropped off Friday afternoon and picked back up on Monday morning.

Bronson Area Fire Association Receives Grant

The Bronson Fire Department (BFD) has been awarded an \$1,800 regional training grant from the Michigan Firefighters Training Council (MFFTC). This is the second training BFD has secured this year which will be paid for entirely by grant funding. In April of this year, BFD hosted a Basic Strategies for Farm Emergencies class at the ProMedica Coldwater Regional Hospital conference room. That class was funded by a Consultation Education and Training (CET) grant awarded by the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration (MIOSHA) and was open to emergency response agencies throughout the region.

The MFFTC grant funds will be used for two emotional health and wellness classes where significant others will accompany first responders to the session. All law enforcement, emergency medical services (EMS) providers, and 911 dispatchers in the county will be invited and any firefighter in the state is welcome to attend. Dealing with stressful calls for service can impact a responder's family life as well as their emotional health. This class helps responders learn to properly process stressful incidents and gives options to their significant others on how to support their loved ones.

BFD administrators have taken a proactive approach in seeking grant funding to help increase the quality of services provided to the community and the health and safety of BFD personnel.
